From the Pastor's Desk:

As we come to the month of April, we are almost immediately into Holy Week. On Saturday (1 April) and Sunday (2 April) we celebrate Palm Sunday. At the end of the week, we observe "the Great Three Days": Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil (Holy Saturday), and, on Sunday (9 April) we gather for the observance and celebration of Easter Day (please see the calendar at the back of the Newsletter for the times). The 40 days of Lent have, I hope, created within us a deep hunger for the Resurrection of Jesus, not so that our Lenten fasting (whatever that has been) is finally over and we can go back to "life as usual", but so that by the time we gather for the Feast of the Resurrection, we have been prepared to have our deepest hunger and thirst – the hunger and thirst for a deep and profound communion with Christ – filled to overflowing. Having died with Christ, we will be raised with him (Romans 6).

The Resurrection of Jesus defines our faith. We may think of the Resurrection of Jesus as the logical conclusion to such a great life; after all, don't all Christians go to heaven? Such a misunderstanding of what the Resurrection is about completely misses the point. Jesus' Resurrection was a totally unique event is the entirety of history.

When we read the New Testament, particularly as we see the reaction of the Jewish leaders in the early chapters of the Book of Acts, we quickly see why it mattered. The majority of Jews (the Sadducees being an exception) believed in the future resurrection, the thing that God would do at the end of history. The problem for them was that the followers of Jesus were proclaiming the Resurrection of one individual, an individual who had been convicted and executed by crucifixion (e.g., Acts 4.2; 17.18; 23.6; 24.21; & 26.23!). In the Book of Acts, Paul said, "I am on trial for the resurrection", not just about the concept of resurrection, but the proclamation of the bodily resurrection of the crucified Jesus, not that it would happen sometime in the unknown future, but that it had already happened to one particular man at a particular time in our history!!!

We must not miss the centrality of Jesus' resurrection. As one contemporary New Testament Scholar has put it, "What Israel believed God would do for her at the end of her long history, He had done for Jesus in the middle of history."

When we turn to the letters of Paul and as we listen to Paul's preaching in the Book of Acts, we encounter someone deeply committed to his Jewish faith and to the hope of Israel; but it all got turned upside down. Because of his encounter with the *risen* Jesus, Paul had to rethink his beliefs in the light of the life, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus and in light of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. In other words, Paul had to work out how through Christ and the Holy Spirit the God of Israel fulfilled his promises and maintained His faithfulness to His covenant.

Jesus' resurrection was unexpected and, in a sense, confusing, even to his disciples, despite the fact that Jesus had told them about it a number of times. The women went to the tomb on that Sunday because they expected Jesus' body to be there; but it was gone. His soul hadn't just "gone to heaven"; God had raised his body, so that Jesus lives forever as the Crucified One, the Lamb who was slain.

Paul tells us in no uncertain terms: If Christ has not been raised, our faith is useless and we are still in our sins. Furthermore, those who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. For if only in this life we have hope in Christ, we should be pitied more than anyone (see 1 Corinthians 15.17-19). When we affirm our faith each Sunday, we not only say, "On the third day he rose again"; we also affirm, "[I believe] in the resurrection of the body".


This message empowers everything we do – in song, prayers, words, giving, fellowship, service, particularly in the Word and in the Sacraments; in fact, this is our very life. There is no Christian faith without the resurrection of Jesus. When we go out "into the world" each day, the resurrection empowers our living, because the Holy Spirit empowers our lives with the life of the crucified, risen, ascended and reigning Jesus. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

UPCOMING BIBLE STUDY – A SURVEY OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

On Thursday, 20 April, Bible Study will resume as we begin a survey of the Old Testament. If you want a better understanding of the Old Testament and why it is essential and central to the Christian faith, I invite you to join us. Classes are from 6:00 - 7:00 every Thursday in the Fellowship Hall. Please bring your Bible with you. I encourage you to start reading, beginning with Genesis 1, and continue reading as much as you can. Again, this Bible Study will be a survey of the Old Testament, not an in-depth study of each book.

The liturgies of Holy Week have the potential to plunge the faithful who participate in them into the central mystery of our faith, the Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. God is present to us during liturgical worship, and when we worship, we can be present to God. The saving events in the life of Jesus Christ remembered during Holy Week make this week different from all other weeks of the year.

"Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to the whole creation!"

-Mark 16:15

The American Lutheran missiologist, James A. Scherer says, "For Luther, mission is always pre-eminently the work of the triune God—missio Dei—and its goal and outcome is the coming of the kingdom of God. Luther sees the church, along with God's word and every baptized believer, as crucial divine instruments for mission. Yet, nowhere does the reformer make the church the starting point or the final goal of mission, as 19th-century missiology tended to do. It is always God's own mission that dominates Luther's thought, and the coming of the kingdom of God represents its final culmination" (James A. Scherer, Gospel, Church, & Kingdom: Comparative Studies in World Mission Theology [Minneapolis: Augsburg Publishing House, 1987], 55).

As one of the Core Values of the North American Lutheran Church is Mission Driven, it is important for us to be reminded that this is not our mission, our vision, our strategy, but it is "pre-eminently the work of the triune God—*missio Dei!*"

This year's NALC Lutheran Week completes a six-year focus on the Holy Trinity, concluding now with "God the Father Creates...in His Image," as the theme for the **Braaten-Benne Theological Lectures**. However, it seems appropriate to conclude this cycle with the theme, *Missio Dei*, as we celebrate the fact that everything we do as a mission-driven Lutheran body comes from God and His mission—that we are to go into all the world, empowered by the Holy Spirit, preaching the good news of salvation in and through Jesus Christ—to the whole creation!

Our prayer is that this year's **Mission Convocation** will indeed be a mission-oriented and mission-driven gathering! While there will be necessary times dedicated to reports, actions and elections—including the election of a bishop—highlights will be the several "On Fire for Mission" sessions, focusing on domestic mission, international mission and mission related to congregational life. These will begin with brief Bible study and devotional periods, followed by presentations on the theme, with extended time for table talk, reflection, breakouts, and strategies for "taking it home!"

We are also excited to hold a **Faith Formation Festival** ("Everything You Want to Know About Youth & Family Ministry") and the **Gathering of the Women of the NALC** ("Using Our Gifts to Serve") earlier in the week.

The hope and prayer of all involved is that this will light a spark or fan the flame for mission, that we return home inspired and excited about *missio Dei*—the work and mission of God in our local congregations, in North America and throughout the whole creation!

Birds of the Northeast - Barn Swallow

One of our most familiar birds in rural areas and semi-open country, this swallow is often seen skimming low over fields with a flowing, graceful flight. It seems to have adopted humans as neighbors, typically placing its nest in barns or garages, or under bridges or wharves; indeed, it is now rare to find a Barn Swallow nest in a site that is not manmade. The species is also common across Europe and Asia, wintering to southern Africa and South America.

<u>Feeding Behavior</u> -is mostly captured and eaten in the air. Often forages quite low over water or fields. In bad weather, may sometimes feed on the ground. <u>Eggs</u> -4-5, sometimes 6, rarely 7. White, spotted with brown. Incubation is by both sexes (female does more), 13-17 days. Young: Both parents feed young. One or two additional birds, the pair's offspring from previous broods, may attend the nest and sometimes feed the nestlings. Young leave the nest about 18-23 days after hatching. 1 or 2 broods per year.

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<u>Diet</u> -Insects. Feeds on a wide variety of flying insects, especially flies (including house flies and horse flies), beetles, wasps, wild bees, winged ants, and true bugs. Also eats some moths, damselflies, grasshoppers, and other insects, and a few spiders and snails. Only occasionally eats a few berries or seeds.

Nesting -Courtship involves aerial chases. On perch, mated pair sit close together, touch bills, preen each other's feathers. Several pairs may nest in same immediate area, but does not form dense colonies like some swallows.

<u>Nest</u>-Original natural sites were in sheltered crevices in cliffs or shallow caves. Sites used today are mostly in open buildings, under eaves, under bridges or docks, or similar places. Nest (built by both sexes) is a cup of mud and dried grass, lined with feathers.

Gen Z Christians Want Leaders to Keep It Real,

As Generation Z teens grow up, many are moving further away from Christian faith and challenging church leaders to adapt to new expectations from the youngest their flocks. Last month. Research reported that young adults aged 18 to 22 are half as likely to identify as Christian and follow Jesus than teenagers aged 13 to 17. A slight majority of today's young adults-52 percent-don't identify as Christians. The young people of Gen Z are diverse, educated, and social media savvy. When it comes to faith, they're open to Jesus and his teachings but skeptical about institutions and leaders putting on a façade. Kendall Johnson, 20, became a believer in college and established her faith through campus ministry, but it was the "real and raw" women of her local church in Raleigh, North Carolina, that helped her grow spiritually. Though older than she, they reached out to talk and share struggles from their own lives. Their openness, Johnson said, "allows me to see how much faith and trust they have in Jesus. It showed me Christianity is relational with one another [and] relational with God." Young Christians like Johnson expect the same kind of transparency, honesty, and authenticity from their leaders. "For some generations, the more mythical their spiritual leaders, the more they trusted them," said Darrell Hall, author of Speaking Across Generations: Messages That Satisfy Boomers, Xers, Millennials, Gen Z, and Beyond. "Gen Zers want there to be no gap between Darrell and Dr. Hall. No gap in persona. No gap in who I am and who I present myself to be." To cultivate genuine relationships, Hall said leaders need be accessible to students, meeting in person and keeping up on social media and apps like GroupMe. Gen Z students also appreciate two-way conversations where they're invited to think out loud with leaders and come to conclusions together. Hall has seen this approach work at home with his own three Gen Z kids. If he wants chores done sooner, instead of telling them what to do, he explains why he wants them to do their chores now and sets it up as a proposition, creating a dialogue with his kids. In a spiritual context, Gen Z Christians appreciate hearing pastors offer up their own gaps of understanding with Scripture and discuss times they've struggled with their faith or a certain topic...

Beet Pickled Deviled Eggs

Pickled Eggs

1 dozen hard boiled eggs

2 cans sliced beets or 1 lb. fresh beets, boiled until tender, sliced, reserving cooking liquid

1 cup apple cider vinegar

1/2 cup sugar

2 TBSP whole black peppercorns

4 TBSP pickling spice

1 small red onion, sliced

Deviled Pickled Eggs

2 TBS unsalted butter

1/3 cup mayonnaise

1/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp black pepper

Fresh chives

Instructions – Combine all the liquid from canned or jarred beets (reserving the beets), apple cider vinegar, sugar, pickling spice, and black peppercorns to a saucepan. Bring to a simmer for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and allow to cool. Add sliced beets, sliced onion, and peeled hard-boiled eggs to the cooled liquid. Refrigerate for at least 24 hours or up to 7 days.

<u>Deviled eggs</u> – Slice deviled pickled eggs, remove yolk. Combine yolk, mayonnaise, butter, salt and pepper in the bowl of a food processor. Pulse until well combined and fluffy. Fill egg halves with yolk mixture and top with sliced chives or pickled onions form the mixture.
