#### From the Pastor's Desk:

How do we know what it means to be Americans, citizens of the United States of America? If we live legally in this country, we share something in common, regardless of where we or our parents came from. When a person takes the time to read the Declaration of Independence, the Federalist and Anti-Federalist Papers, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, we are reading part of the history and the "spirit" of America.

There is something truly amazing about this nation. One of our defining principles is freedom: we are free to be citizens of this country. We are free to practice our faith (or not to practice a faith/religion) without coercion. Our nation does not have or support a "State Church", like the Church of England. No politician or monarch is the head of the church.

The celebration of freedom, officially recognized on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, is a constant reminder of the blessings of this nation. It should also be a call to diligence. We must not fall into the trap of thinking that freedom means we can do whatever we want (because we want to). American freedom allows all people to live as citizens and under our laws. As I write these words and as you read them, we know that we live in tumultuous times (to put it mildly). People are afraid – for good reasons. There are people in this country who want to destroy it in any way they can. We have laws on the books that are supposed to protect us by making it harder for people carry out these acts. But we have entirely too many politicians who refuse to see it, or who see it and don't care. When a radical terrorists loot and destroy businesses and people's livelihood and then people in positions of authority and power tell us that the real problem is Christians (and/or people who belong to a certain political party), we have a clear indication that something is deeply wrong. (*Please read the quote printed below.*)

And here is my point: as Christians, we have been set free – free from sin and death (read especially Romans 6). But we are not simply free; we are servants/slaves of Christ. We are not free to do whatever we want; we are bound to Christ and to his commandments, to live in obedience. As Christians, we continually bring ourselves to the feet of Christ to have the light of the Gospel shine upon and into our living and thinking. As Christians we want (or should want) to know the truth about ourselves. We do not shy away from confession and forgiveness, because we desire to be shaped more and more into the image of Christ.

If we need to read and understand our founding documents to appreciate the greatness of this nation – despite its flaws – and the responsibilities that are placed on us as citizens, it is even more important that we read, study, and live the Holy Scriptures, given to us by the Holy Spirit. That is only possible when we yield to the leading of the Spirit. We must live and speak the truth – tell the truth about the world, about good and evil, about love and hate, about right and wrong – without worrying that someone might be offended. If we really, truly, and sincerely believe the message of the Gospel – the message of life and death – then we have no choice;

we have to proclaim it and live it, no matter what. If Jesus is Lord, then the Gospel is not just about individual Christian's personal and private "spirituality"; it is about a new world and a new creation in Christ.

I am wondering what I have to do from now on to live out the life and ministry to which Christ commissions me. I invite you to pray for me and for one another. Perhaps there is a way St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church can even more faithfully proclaim the Good News: Jesus Christ is Lord.

FREEDOM

The following are the words of Os Guinness from his 2022 book *Zero Hour America: History's Ultimatum over Freedom and the Answer We Must Give* (Downers Grove: IVP, 2022), pp. 3-5:

Howl, America! Howl! Howl like the Hebrew prophets howled over the fate of their people before the destruction of Jerusalem in 586 BC! ... Howl for the way the fabled "land of the free" has turned its back on what made it free and is pursuing phantoms that lead to decline and ruin. Howl for how America has come to be what the world sees today – a world superpower still, wealthy, prosperous, and powerful but unrecognizable in terms of the ideals of its past and stumbling leaderless from one blunder to another. Howl for the way America is blindly ignoring its day of reckoning and opting for its own decline, careless about what it would take to avert it. Howl for the way a society fostering so much hate between its citizens appears to be yearning for its own destruction.

Have Americans forgotten their great why? The thousand and one ways their ancestors were not free elsewhere and the distinctive way that they were to live as a free people in the land of the free — with an ordered freedom born of freely chosen consent, a mutually binding pledge, and reciprocal responsibility of all for all? Not simply a democracy but a covenantal-constitutional republic that would witness to the world a better way of demonstrating human dignity, justice, freedom, and peace? Have Americans failed to realize that in choosing to be "one nation under God" they chose to be always accountable and always under the judgment of heaven for their deeds? Is America's stunning incomprehension about the present crisis the result of a blindness that is spiritual as well as intellectual?

...Most Americans show little evidence that they understand freedom and the commitments that freedom requires of them. America now stands uncertainly, stunned and bemused through its ignorance of its enemies without and within. America's conscience is battered. America's public life is torn between the guilt of a sullied past, the pull of a power-hungry establishment oligarchy, and the countering pull of a radical left-wing revolution that has never worked anywhere or at any time, and that has always ended in failure and oppression. America after two and a half centuries has grown into a wealthy, elitist, technocratic, bureaucratic, and corporatist world power that alternately suppresses and squanders freedom with a prodigal carelessness that defies all reason — and despite all this still seems largely unaware of the deadliest peril it faces.

Classic Bean Salad (Better than Grandma's)

#### **Ingredients**

- \*15-ounce can kidney beans, \*15-ounce can white beans or pinto beans
- \*15-ounce can green beans, \*15-ounce can wax beans (or another 15-ounce can green beans)
- \*1/2 medium white onion, \*1/4 medium red onion (optional)
- \*2 tablespoons chopped curly parsley (or Italian parsley)
- \*½ cup white vinegar, \*¼ cup olive oil, \*2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- \*¼ teaspoon each dried dill and garlic powder, \*1 teaspoon kosher salt
- \*Fresh ground black pepper

**Instructions** - Drain and rinse the beans. Thinly slice the onions into slivers; Finely chop the parsley. In a large bowl, whisk together the white vinegar, olive oil, sugar, dill, garlic, powder, and kosher salt. Add the beans, onions and parsley and stir until coated. You can eat immediately, but for best results refrigerate for 1 hour to allow the salad to marinate. Store leftovers refrigerated for up to 5 days.



## Mission Week 2023 – August 7-11 Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

As one of the Core Values of the North American Lutheran Church is Mission Driven, it is important for us to be reminded that this is not our mission, our vision, our strategy, but it is "pre-eminently the work of the triune God—missio Dei!"

This year's NALC Lutheran Week completes a six-year focus on the Holy Trinity, concluding now with "God the Father Creates...in His Image," as the theme for the Braaten-Benne Theological Lectures. However, it seems appropriate to conclude this cycle with the theme, *Missio Dei*, as we celebrate the fact that everything we do as a mission-driven Lutheran body comes from God and His mission—that we are to go into all the world, empowered by the Holy Spirit, preaching the good news of salvation in and through Jesus Christ—to the whole creation!

Our prayer is that this year's Mission Convocation will indeed be a mission-oriented and mission-driven gathering! While there will be necessary times dedicated to reports, actions and elections—including the election of a bishop—highlights will be the several "On Fire for Mission" sessions, focusing on domestic mission, international mission and mission related to congregational life. These will begin with brief Bible study and devotional periods, followed by presentations on the theme, with extended time for table talk, reflection, breakouts, and strategies for "taking it home!"

We are also excited to hold a **Faith Formation Festival** ("Everything You Want to Know About Youth & Family Ministry") and the **Gathering of the Women of the NALC** ("Using Our Gifts to Serve") earlier in the week.

The hope and prayer of all involved is that this will light a spark or fan the flame for mission, that we return home inspired and excited about *missio Dei*—the work and mission of God in our local congregations, in North America and throughout the whole creation!

#### Check out the St. Mark's Church Library!

We have a wonderful variety of great reads in our library. Check out "The Engineer's Wife" by Tracey Enerson Wood, on display on the round table. A story with ties to a local community, Saxonburg.

"She built the Brooklyn Bridge, so why don't you know her name? Based on the true story of an American icon, The Engineer's Wife delivers an emotional portrait of a woman transformed by a project of unfathomable scale, which takes her into the bowels of the East River, suffragette riots, the halls of Manhattan's elite, and the heady, freewheeling temptations of P.T. Barnum. The biography of a husband and wife determined to build something that lasts? even at the risk of losing each other."

Saxonburg Borough is a relatively small borough, but it celebrates its history extremely well. It was founded by Friedrich and John Roebling, brothers who emigrated from Germany to seek freedom from oppression in Germany. They founded Saxonburg as a farming community, and once they were settled in, John returned to his core passion of engineering. In Saxonburg, John A. Roebling created the innovation of wire rope, a technology that made the creation of easier to build and stronger bridges. Roebling would go on to create a series of critical bridges, for which Pittsburgh was the testing ground for the technology, and the pinnacle of his projects was the Brooklyn Bridge, the first bridge to successfully cross the East River and connect the then twin cities of New York City and Brooklyn. ## <u>Birds of the Northeast</u> – Chipping Sparrow https://www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/Chipping\_Sparrow/overview#

A crisp, pretty sparrow whose bright rufous cap both provides a splash of color and makes adults fairly easy to identify. Chipping Sparrows are common across North America wherever trees are interspersed with grassy openings. Their loud, trilling songs are one of the most common sounds of spring woodlands and suburbs.

<u>Habitat-</u> You'll find Chipping Sparrows around trees, even though these birds spend a lot of time foraging on the ground. Look for them in grassy forests, woodlands and edges, parks and shrubby or tree-lined backyards. Chipping Sparrows seem to gravitate toward evergreens in places where these trees are available. They also use aspen, birch, oak, pecan, and eucalyptus trees. In the mountains, you can find these birds all the way up to tree line.

<u>Diet -</u> Chipping Sparrows mainly eat seeds of a great variety of grasses and herbs. During the breeding season they also hunt for protein-rich insects, and these form a large part of their summer diet. Chipping Sparrows sometimes eat small fruits such as cherries

Nesting – Females typically build their nests between 3 and 10 feet off the ground, hidden in foliage at the tip of a branch. They gravitate toward evergreen trees, but also nest in crabapples, honeysuckle tangles, maples, ornamental shrubs, and other deciduous species. Females can be finicky about placement, often beginning to build a nest, then leaving to begin in another spot. Males guard females as they build nests, but they don't help build. It takes the female 3 to 4 days to finish her nest, a loose cup of rootlets and dried grasses so flimsy you can often see through it. She lines the nest with animal hair and fine plant fibers. Finished nests measure about 4.5 inches across and 2.2 inches deep. Behavior - In summer, male Chipping Sparrows defend territories against other Chipping Sparrows, but often tolerate other species as long as they don't go too near the nest. After the breeding season, Chipping Sparrows form flocks of several dozen, foraging together among grasses and at bird feeders. Their flight pattern is energetic, straight, and only slightly undulating.

Eggs/Young - 1-3 broods of 2-7 eggs; Pale blue to white, lightly streaked or spotted with black, brown, or purplish. Incubation Period of 10-15 days and a Nestling Period of9-12 days. Chicks are Naked, helpless, eyes closed, with a few wispy down feathers on the head and body. New hatchlings weigh about one-twentieth of an ounce.
