#### From the Pastor's Desk:

Every year, as we approach the month of May, a lot of people — especially students in school, but even teachers and school staff — have one thing in common: they are all looking forward to summer break. And it is great to have some time away from school. But by the middle of August — if not before — many are looking forward to September. (I was talking to a neighbor back in early July. She and her husband have three children. She said, "I can't wait for school to start back up!" She even knew how many days until the first day of school!!!) By the time we reach the first of September, most schools have already resumed.

So, as we move into September and the fall season, I want to ask you to do something, I want to issue a challenge to you: beginning in September and continuing through the rest of the year, make an effort to invite someone to worship at St. Mark's. It could be someone who is not currently affiliated with a church, or it could be an inactive member of St. Mark's. If you find someone who is interested, you can point them to the church website (<a href="www.stmarksbutler.org">www.stmarksbutler.org</a>), where they will find a lot of information, including a link to the online video recordings of Sunday morning worship.

And while we're on that subject, I want to comment that these online resources, as well as the broadcast of the lessons and sermon on Butler radio, are of great benefit to our homebound members. However, too many of us have substituted these experiences for gathered worship. I know this is hard to hear (read), but it's the truth. It forces us to come to grips with what it really means to be the church and how the life and mission of the church are carried out. Unfortunately, far too many Christians have separated the two. We look at the church as an institution that serves us and our needs, because we don't fully understand what it means to be the church. (And this isn't just a St. Mark's problem; almost every Pastor I know has expressed similar concerns.)

Most important is the fact that the sacrament of the Lord's Supper – *central* to the Christian faith and life – is celebrated in the life of the gathered community of Christ (except in circumstances when I or an approved layperson takes communion to someone who is homebound). At St. Mark's, holy communion is celebrated at every Saturday service (5:00 p.m.) and at every Sunday morning service (9:00), so that whenever anyone worships here, he or she always has an opportunity to receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

As you can see from Darcie's page (page #3 in this newsletter), children's Sunday School, Confirmation, and First Communion classes will resume in September and October. Please take time to read her page. I will be teaching Confirmation classes beginning on 17 September in the conference room on Sunday mornings after worship. Any youth in 7<sup>th</sup> grade or higher are encouraged to be in confirmation. Classes are held almost every Sunday from September to the end of May for two years. The four units focus on the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the Sacraments, and the Apostles' Creed. The lessons in each unit follow *Martin Luther's Small Catechism*. Each student will be given a copy. I will also expand our lessons with other exercises from the Bible, especially memorization of the order of the books of the Bible. So, we will be busy very soon.

Before we know it, we'll be celebrating the Reformation (observed on Saturday and Sunday, 28/29 October), All Saints (4/5 November), Thanksgiving Eve (22 November), Christ the King/Reign of Christ (25/26 November), and the beginning of Advent (2/3 December), not to mention our Congregational Annual Meeting (12 November).

During 2023 so far, we welcomed 8 new adult members into our church family and celebrated Holy Baptism (with 3 more baptisms to be celebrated soon). I just received request from 3 other adults who want to become a member of St. Mark's. So, I encourage you to come and worship and celebrate these moments with our Pastor Phillips brothers and sisters who gather for worship at St. Mark's. Blessings,




St. Mark's is heading back to the Masonic Shelter at Alameda for the annual Church Picnic.

Selbo as their bishop during the NALC Mission Convocation in Oklahoma City, OK, Receiving 77% of votes on the first ballot. Bishop Selbo's re-election stands as a testament to his unwavering commitment, strong leadership, and vision for the church's future. The announcement of his reelection was made by NALC General Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Amy Little on Thursday, August 10, 2023.

As we move forward into the future together, our mission remains firmly anchored in the teachings and love of Christ, and our enduring commitment to discipleship, both locally and globally. I am profoundly honored by this reelection and the immense trust placed in me. My earnest prayer is that together, as one unified body, we will continue to participate in the mission and work of God by lifting up Jesus as Lord and Savior of all, that the world might be drawn by the Holy Spirit to Him."

On August 3<sup>rd</sup>, Pastor and I (Jessie) went with Phyllis and Jerry Kaltenbaugh to the NALC Disaster Response warehouse in Caldwell, Ohio. We were shown the new facility for youth mission housing (see pictures below). As you can tell, it is not completed. With the increasing cost of supplies they will need assistance from our NALC congregations.

Since arriving at St. Mark's, I have seen how giving this church is. So, if this mission leads your heart to give, please do so. Please make your payable check to North America Lutheran Church (NALC) with NALC Disaster Response in the memo space.

I would also like to thank all those that helped the NALC Disaster Response with \$625 in gift cards and 3T for their numerous quilts, throws, and shawls. This assistance will help those victims of natural disasters.







Maui update: On Tuesday Aug. 8, a firestorm fueled in part by fierce winds from the Category 4 Hurricane Dora's 140 mph winds that triggered raging fires on the island of Maui. These fires hit the historic town of Lahaina, a popular tourist destination and economic hub. The wildfires also impacted the communities of Kihei and Kula. As of Tuesday Aug. 22, the death toll from the Maui wildfires has surpassed 114, with over 850 people still unaccounted. Authorities are continuing to search the community by grids and the harbor waters for remains. This is the deadliest United States wildfire in more than 100 years. 3,000+ homes, businesses, schools,

government and cultural centers are destroyed. This wildfire caused more than a loss of homes and land, but a loss of identity, loss of heritage, and a loss of *ohana* as known there. Everyone on the island of Maui has been affected directly or indirectly by these fires, and all are suffering and mourning their losses. An estimated 12,000 people are displaced, with people in shelters that will be closing soon, placed in hotels for the next 45 days, or living in their vehicles, tents in the park, on the street, or with family and friends. With businesses destroyed, there is also a massive loss of jobs, income, and tourism. NALC Disaster Response is providing support through local partners, shipping gift cards and other supplies for emergency relief. #### Notes from the Kitchen......



# Caponata (Eggplant Antipasta)

This is a great low calorie appetizer that can be served with crackers.

#### **Ingredients:**

- 3 c Eggplant, diced into ½" pieces & soaked in salted water for 15
- Small onion diced
- ½ green pepper, diced
- 1# of mushrooms, diced or 1 small can
- 1 6 oz. can of tomato paste
- ¼ c sliced green olives
- ½ c water
- 2 tsp vinegar
- ½ tsp sugar
- ½ tsp garlic
- ½ tsp Italian seasoning
- Salt & pepper to taste

#### **Instructions:**

Drain & rinse the eggplant & sauté in a skillet with olive oil. Add the onions, green pepper, & mushrooms. Cook until tender. Mix in the remaining ingredients. Serve alone or with crackers warm or chilled.

#### Birds of the Northeast – Mourning Dove



The mournful cooing of the Mourning Dove is one of our most familiar bird sounds. From southern Canada to central Mexico, this is one of our most common birds, often abundant in open country and along roadsides. European settlement of the continent, with its opening of the forest, probably helped this species to increase. It also helps itself, by breeding prolifically: in warm climates, Mourning Doves may raise up to six broods per year, more than any other native bird.

<u>Habitat-</u> Farms, towns, open woods, roadsides, grasslands. Found in almost any kind of open or semi-open habitat in temperate parts of North America, including forest clearings, farmland, suburbs, prairies, deserts. May be most common in edge habitats having both trees and open ground, but also found in some treeless areas. Avoids unbroken forest.

<u>Diet</u> - Seeds. Feeds almost entirely on seeds (99% of diet). Favors seeds of cultivated grains, also those of grasses, ragweeds, many other plants. Occasionally eats snails, very rarely any insects.

Nesting – In courtship, male flies up with noisy wingbeats and then goes into long circular glide, wings fully spread and slightly bowed down. On ground, male approaches female stiffly, his chest puffed out, bowing and giving emphatic cooing song. Members of mated pairs may preen each other's feathers. Nest: Male leads female to potential nest sites; female chooses one. Site is usually in tree or shrub, sometimes on ground, sometimes on building ledge or other structure; usually lower than 40', rarely up to 100' or more above ground. Nest is very flimsy platform of twigs; male brings material, female builds.

<u>Behavior</u> - Forages mostly on ground; sometimes will perch on plants to take seeds. Will come to bird feeders, often eating on the ground under elevated feeders. Eats quickly to fill crop with seeds, then digests them while resting. Regularly swallows grit (small gravel) to aid in digestion of hard seeds

<u>Young -</u> Incubation is by both parents, about 14 days. Both parents feed young "pigeon milk." Young leave nest at about 15 days, usually wait nearby to be fed for next 1-2 weeks. One pair may raise as many as 5-6 broods per year in southern areas.
