From the Pastor's Desk:

Brothers and Sisters, grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

As I begin this article, let me express my sincerest thanks to the members of this congregation. Over the past few months, we have been blessed with several visitors at worship, particularly on Sunday morning, but some on Saturday evening. In my conversations with these visitors, every one of them has told me not only how much they appreciated our services, but also how friendly the people of St. Mark's are. In the (now) three years that Jessie and I have been here, I have constantly appealed to you to make an effort to welcome visitors, to welcome one another! If you are sitting in the congregation and see someone you don't know, please make time to introduce yourself and let that person know you are glad he or she is here. Share the peace of Christ with someone other than the person sitting next to you. Look at it this way: how would you feel if you were visiting another church, and no one spoke with you or welcomed you? What message would that send? It would say to you, "We don't really care that you're here." And, as I wrote in the September newsletter, please make an effort throughout the rest of the year to invite others to St. Mark's.

There are a number of "special" observances in November: on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> we will celebrate the Feast of All Saints, where we will remember our brothers and sisters who have passed away since the last All Saints service by speaking their names and ringing the bell. On Wednesday, 22 November, we will gather for Thanksgiving Eve worship at 7:00 p.m. Finally, the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> services mark the end of the Christian Year with the observance of "Christ the King/the Reign of Christ." (3 December in the First Sunday of Advent!)

In addition, our Annual Congregational Meeting will take place after worship on Sunday, 12 November. There will be no Saturday evening service on the 11<sup>th</sup>. And, just to be cover "all the bases," remember to set your clocks **back one hour** before you go to bed on Saturday, 4 November.

We have just celebrated the third anniversary of our ministry together at St. Mark's. It's hard for me to believe we have been here that long. But, in other ways, it seems longer than that. We have so many opportunities for worship, fellowship, and service. I pray that God will continue to lead us and bless us, that by the power of his Holy Spirit, he will increase in us faith, hope, and love, as well as the many gifts he has given to us to worship and serve him.

Dear Pastors, Congregations, Partners in Ministry, Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In the wake of the ongoing conflict between Israel and Hamas, which is also emerging in other parts of the region, our hearts are heavy with sorrow and concern for the people and the

nations involved. An abrupt offensive led by Hamas, has resulted in an escalation of violence that has caused abhorrent suffering for countless individuals, families, and communities.

The North American Lutheran Church (NALC) unequivocally condemns the violent actions of any terrorist group, as well as all forms of antisemitism found throughout the world. In contrast, we advocate for peace, justice, and the sanctity of all human life. We believe in the power of prayer and the potential of human hearts to move towards reconciliation and peace under the divine guidance of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We stand with all those in the region who yearn for peace. We pray for the safety and wellbeing of all its inhabitants, remembering that we have brothers and sisters in Christ living in Israel, as well as in other Arab nations including Palestine, who find themselves in dire circumstances amidst the turmoil.

We are mindful of the complex history and deep-rooted tensions that permeate the region. Yet, we ardently pray for an end to the hostilities and for a sustainable resolution that honors the dignity, security, and rights of all individuals. We call upon the leaders involved to act with wisdom, compassion, and a genuine desire for lasting peace.

We invite our pastors, congregations, and partners in ministry to unite in fervent prayer for peace in Israel, Gaza, and the surrounding region, for the illumination and guidance of the leaders involved, and for humanitarian aid to reach those in desperate need. Let us all be praying for a future where enmity is replaced with understanding, oppression with justice, and despair with hope, under the sovereign grace of our loving and Triune God.

I encourage our congregations to be places where our doors are open for comfort and prayer for all of God's people, and where the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, revealed to us in His life, death, and resurrection from the dead for our sin are abundantly present and found. The following prayer is offered for your use, individually, as families, and in your congregations:

Gracious God, in a world overshadowed by sin and strife, we come before You with heavy hearts, seeking Your divine mercy and peace for the people living in Israel, the Gaza Strip, and the surrounding regions. We pray for the leaders of the nations, that their hearts may be stirred towards justice, reconciliation, and the well-being of all people. We pray for those whose lives have been lost, for those torn from their homes and families, as well as for those who are being held hostage in this brutal conflict. We pray for comfort, protection, and healing for wounded spirits and bodies, knowing that all true healing is found in You alone. Lord, may Your boundless love lead us through these dark times towards a horizon of hope, understanding, and enduring peace. Help us to never lose sight of the promises we have in Jesus and to never lose hope in the One who, through His cross and resurrection from the dead, has secured our lives eternally. In the holy and precious name of Jesus, we pray. Amen.

His peace.



*Stuffing Balls -* This is a great side dish that can be made ahead to serve with turkey.

- 1 ½ c. Butter or margarine
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 2 c celery, chopped
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 cans of cream of chicken soup-divided
- 1 can of water- divided
- Seasoning to taste-garlic salt, poultry seasoning, parsley, pepper
- 8-10 c of bread, cubed



**Directions:** In a saucepan, sauté the onions & celery til tender. Remove from heat & add eggs, 1 can of cream of chicken soup & 1 c of water. In a separate bowl, toss the seasonings with the bread. Pour the onion, celery & soup mixture over the bread. Form balls & place in a greased 9x13" pan. Before putting it in the oven, mix the last can of soup with water & pour over the stuffing balls. Cover & baked for 35-40 minutes at 350 degrees. If you like a crusty stuffing, bake it, uncovered.

# Trivia for the month of October

The term "Indian Summer" has been around for centuries. What is an Indian Summer or Second Summer? Where did this term originate, and what is its meaning today? For over two centuries, The Old Farmer's Almanac has gone by the adage: "If All Saints' (Nov. 1) brings out winter, St. Martin's(Nov. 11) brings out Indian summer." The weather phenomenon is best described using the term that Europeans and British still use: St. Martin's Summer. This references St. Martin's Day—November 11—the official start of these unusually late warm spells. Another popular term used by the American Meteorological Society is which is "Second Summer," indeed appropriately descriptive.

Here are several criteria for this weather phenomenon, according to *The Old Farmer's Almanac*.

- 1. It's a period of abnormally warm weather occurring in late autumn between St. Martin's Day (November 11) and November 20, with generally clear skies, sunny but hazy days, and cool nights.
- The time of occurrence is important: It
  occurs after at least one good killing
  frost but also be before the first snowfall;
  preferably a substantial period of
  normally cool weather must precede this
  warm spell.
- As well as being warm, the atmosphere is hazy or smoky, there is no wind, the barometer is standing high, and the nights are clear and chilly.
- 4. A moving, cool, shallow polar air mass is converting into a deep, warm, stagnant anticyclone (high pressure) system, which has the effect of causing the haze and large swing in temperature between day and night.

Given above criteria, this weather phenomenon does not occur every year and it occurs more than once some years.

### JOKE OF THE MONTH

<u>Birds of the Northeast</u> – Yellow-rumped Warbler

<u>Nesting</u> - During courtship, male accompanies female everywhere, fluffs his side feathers, raises his wings and

his colorful crown feathers, calls and flutters. Nest: Placed 4-50' above ground, usually on horizontal branch away from trunk of conifer, sometimes in deciduous tree; or sometimes in fork where branch meets trunk. Nest (built by female) is open cup made of bark fibers, weeds, twigs, roots; lined with hair and feathers in such a way as to curve over and partly cover the eggs.

**Eggs** - 4-5, sometimes only 3. Creamy white with brown and gray marks. Incubated usually by female, 12-13 days. Occasionally the male will cover the eggs. Young: Both parents feed nestlings. Young leave nest after 10-12 days, can fly short distances 2-3 days later. First brood probably fed mostly by male after fledging. Normally 2 broods per year.

Feeding Behavior - Versatile in its feeding. Searches among twigs and leaves, and will hover while taking insects from foliage. Often flies out to catch flying insects. Will forage on ground, and will cling to tree trunks and branches. Males tend to forage higher than females during the breeding season. In winter, usually forages in flocks; Yellow-rumped Warblers are talented foragers, primarily feeding on insects like grasshoppers, spiders, gnats, and caterpillars during spring and summer. They glean prey from leaves as they skulk along branches or hover in mid-air, and they frequently flycatch, sallying out from exposed limbs like a pewee. The birds can also be found on the ground in search of food.

<u>Diet</u> - Insects and berries. Feeds on caterpillars, wasps, grasshoppers, gnats, aphids, beetles, and many other insects; also spiders. Feeds in winter on berries of bayberry, juniper, wax myrtle, poison ivy, and others. Can winter farther north than most warblers because it can digest the wax in berry coatings; High levels of bile salts allow them to digest the wax found in the coating of berries from a variety of plants, including bayberry, juniper, wax myrtle, and poison ivy.

<u>Nickname</u> - Many birds have nicknames, including timberdoodle (American Woodcock) and peep (sandpipers), but the Yellow-rumped has one of the more memorable monikers in the bird world:

**butterbutt**. This, of course, refers to the bright yellow rump patch for which the bird is named.




