From the Pastor's Desk:

Brothers and Sisters, grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

This is a first for me. As I begin this article, it is just after 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, 31 October 2023 (Halloween). I have never started a newsletter article this early – almost a month ahead!!! But I, like most of you (as well as millions of people around the world), have been giving a lot of thought to what is going on in our nation and across the globe. Let me ask you to pause right here before you continue reading and ask yourself what I might be referring to. What did you come up with?

You might be thinking, "Pastor, it's December. Surely, you'll be writing about the joys of the celebration of Advent and Christmas." You'd be partly right. We are called to celebrate the message of Advent and Christmas – "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called 'Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace'" (Isaiah 9.6, Revised Standard Version). We are all familiar with these words from our many times in worship during Christmas or from listening to Handel's Messiah. But notice the context of this passage: Isaiah 9 opens with these words, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in the land of deep darkness, on them a light has shined" (9.2). (I would encourage you to devote the four weeks of Advent to the reading of the Book of Isaiah.)

When we turn to the Gospels – particularly Matthew and Luke and, with different emphases, John – we find this theme repeated and its promises fulfilled: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light...." Consider Mary's Magnificat (Luke 1.46-55) and Simon's Nunc Dimittis (Luke 2.29-32; as well as 2.33-35). Consider the powerful Prologue to John's Gospel in John 1.1-18, where is found the affirmation, "In him (the eternal Word, the Son of God) was life, and the life was the light of humanity. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1.4-5). This is the hope of Advent, the gift of Christmas.

My brothers and sisters, we are living in a time of darkness, a darkness that is spreading and tearing apart our communities, our country, and our world. Many of us have been taught about the horrible acts committed in Germany (as well as Poland and other nations) in the late 1930s and early 1940s, news about the Third Reich's attempt to rid the world – or, at least, their part of it – of Jews. They were able to exterminate over six million Jews (and others – supporters, like Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the infirm [mentally and physically challenged], the "unwanted".)

And now there are vile protests in many American universities and colleges. They are also taking place in Russia, where people stormed an airport to attack Jews who had arrived from Tel Aviv. They are taking place in France, where citizens are marking Jewish homes with the Star of David or with swastikas. Today I heard a report about an American teacher/professor who asked his Jewish students to identify themselves. Why? To what end? This cannot be allowed to continue; nothing good and everything bad will come of it. This racism and hatred are

a symptom and manifestation of the very nature of evil. Evil often cloaks itself with different disguises and uses different names, so that we don't see it and understand it for what it is. This evil is "in your face."

What does all this have to do with Christmas? Everything! (Need I remind you that Jesus of Nazareth was a Jew, born to a young, devout Jewish mother and raised by a devout Jewish father?) If we believe the Good News of the incarnation of the eternal Son of God, born of the Virgin Mary, who suffered and died for our sake, who was raised from the dead, who ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of the Father, who has poured out the Holy Spirit to create, empower, and sustain his holy church, we must be the people through whom "the light that has come into the world" will shine. The shining of that light will expose the darkness. Will it be easy? No! Will it take courage? Absolutely! Is it really necessary? Unquestionably! Jesus tells us that we, his followers, are the light of the world. He also issues a sobering warning: "If then the light in you is darkness, how great is that darkness!" (Matthew 6.23b)

As we begin our journey through Advent, beginning on Saturday, 2 December and Sunday, 3 December, I ask you to be faithful in worship, to gather as the people of God in Christ who make up St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church, and to listen carefully to the Word of God read and proclaimed, to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. As I said in a recent sermon, "the world needs the Church. The Church needs to be renewed and empowered." "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

Everyone loves a good Sugar Cookie recipe, especially at this time of year. This is my go-to recipe for basic or cutout sugar cookies. This recipe came from Jane Kennedy who some of you may remember taught at the Junior High some time ago.

Jane's Old Fashioned Sugar Cookies

4 c flour + a bit more for cutouts 1 c Margarine (2 sticks)

1 tsp. Baking powder $1\frac{1}{2}$ c sugar

½ tsp. Baking soda. 1 egg

½ tsp salt ½ c sour cream

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp nutmeg (optional). 1 tsp. Vanilla

*Preheat oven to 375. Blend dry ingredients in a bowl & set aside. Beat the margarine & sugar & egg until light & fluffy. Mix in sour cream & vanilla until smooth. Gradually add the dry ingredients. If making cutout cookies, roll dough out on a Lightly Floured surface to $\frac{1}{4}$ thick. Cut out cookies & bake on a greased cookie sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes.

Ways to finish the cookies:

- Sprinkle cookies with sugar before they are baked
- Brush with egg whites & colored sprinkles before baking
- Bake cookies & ice when cool.

Butter icing

1/3 c margarine

 $4\frac{1}{2}$ c powdered sugar

½ c milk

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla

*Beat margarine til fluffy. Gradually add 2 c powdered sugar. Slowly beat in the milk & vanilla. Then add the remaining sugar til you have the consistency that you like.



Odd Moments This Month in History December 14, 1807: Space Invader

At 6:30 a.m. on this day in 1807, residents from Vermont to Connecticut looked up at the sky and saw a red fireball. About two-thirds the size of a full Moon, it raced across the heavens, broke apart, and fell to earth in at least six areas of Weston (now Easton), Trumbull, and Fairfield, Connecticut. Whizzing sounds were heard close to the impact sites, and three sonic booms were heard as far as 40 miles away. The entire event took about 30 seconds. Upon hearing the news a few days later, Yale professor Benjamin Silliman, accompanied by his colleague, professor James Kingsley, traveled to the impact area to talk to witnesses, examine impact sites, and collect specimens (including some that enterprising townsfolk were selling as souvenirs). Silliman confirmed that it had been a meteorite—the first officially recorded in the New World. Meteorites, rocks that fell from space, were a concept slowly gaining acceptance in Europe, but their study was still a relatively new science. In an article in the Connecticut Herald published on December 29, Silliman and Kingsley described the Weston event. The news rapidly spread to other newspapers, and accounts were published in literary and philosophical journals. Later, Silliman performed a chemical analysis of the rocks and published a revised report. The findings were discussed by scientific notable organizations Philadelphia, London, and Paris. Still, there were skeptics about the idea of meteorites, including U.S. president Thomas Jefferson, who was said to have remarked, "It is easier to believe that two Yankee professors could lie than to admit that stones could fall from heaven." https://www.almanac.com/content/month- of-december-holidays-facts-folklore Source

his rather tame, active, crested little bird is common all year in eastern forests, where its whistled peter-peter-peter song may be

heard even during mid-winter thaws. It is related to the chickadees, and like them it readily comes to bird feeders, often carrying away sunflower seeds one at a time. Feeders may be helping it to expand its range: in recent decades, Tufted Titmice have been steadily pushing north.

Nesting - Pairs may remain together all year, joining small flocks with other titmice in winter. Flocks break up in late winter, and pairs establish nesting territories. Male feeds female often from courtship stage until after eggs hatch. Breeding pair may have a "helper," one of their offspring from the previous year. Nest site is in hole in tree, either natural cavity or old woodpecker hole; averages about 35' above the ground, ranging from 3' to 90' up. Unlike the chickadees, apparently does not excavate its own nest hole. Will also use nest boxes. Nest (probably built by female) has foundation of grass, moss, leaves, bark strips, lined with soft materials, especially animal hair. Bird may pluck hair from live woodchuck, dog, or other animal, even from humans.


Eggs - 5-6, sometimes 3-9. White, finely dotted with brown, reddish, or purple. Incubation is by female only, 12-14 days. Young: Female stays with young much of time at first, while male brings food; later, young are fed by both parents, sometimes by additional helper. Young leave nest about 15-16 days after hatching.

Feeding Behavior – Forages by hopping actively among branches and twigs of trees, often hanging upside down, sometimes hovering momentarily. Often drops to the ground for food as well. Comes to bird feeders for seeds or suet. Opens acorns and seeds by holding them with feet and pounding with bill. Will store food items, retrieving them later.

Diet - Mostly insects and seeds. Insects make up close to two-thirds of annual diet, with caterpillars the most important prey in summer; also eats wasps, bees, sawfly larvae, beetles, true bugs, scale insects, and many others, including many insect eggs and pupae. Also eats some spiders, snails. Seeds, nuts, berries, and small fruits are important in diet especially in winter.
