From the Pastor's Desk: The week between Christmas and New Year's Day is usually much quieter and less hectic than the previous weeks, even though we are still in the Christmas Season. So much took place and so much hard work and planning went into everything that happened. Christmas celebrations may not even be over for some of you: you have extended family "get-togethers" even into January. Many businesses and organizations hold their "Holiday Parties" in January (partly because venues are easier to book and cheaper after "the Holidays").

We have very little "down time"; we continue to celebrate and proclaim the birth of our Lord. And before we realize it, Lent will begin: Ash Wednesday will be on February 14. The structure of the Christian Year calls us to vigilance and faithfulness in living out and proclaiming the Gospel. With the beginning of the Christian Year each First Sunday of Advent, we renew our commitment to grow in the knowledge of Christ and of his will for us. St. Paul continually challenges the communities of believer to which he writes to grow. As Christians we know that we are always in need: in need of forgiveness and grace; in need of strength and encouragement. We desire and hunger to know Christ more fully and more clearly. We desire to know and to do his will.



As we begin and new calendar year (even though we have been in the new Liturgical/Christian Year for a month), what are we expecting? As we "look forward", what do we see or hope to see? What do we desire for ourselves and for our family? What are we praying for most fervently? Life is not static and unchanging; it is filled with many different surprises and challenges. We know that we are not in control of everything. Some of us are facing uncertainties in our lives and in our families. And even though we say we want to do God's will and that we want God to accomplish his will in and through us, we are not always comfortable with what that might mean for us.

Far too many people believe that the reason Jesus was born among us, suffered, died, and rose again for us, was so that he would make our lives easier. Unfortunately, that message is spewed out across television, radio, print media, and the internet, as prosperity preachers distort the Gospel of Jesus and turn it into a "self-help" program. Notice sometimes how frequently the words *you, me, or I* are at the center of these messages. Very seldom do we hear the call to utter and complete sacrifice of ourselves to Christ, without regard for ourselves or the acquisition of things. The Christian life is about God's glory, not ours!

As we move forward in our lives together as the body of Christ, gathered under the name St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church, let us commit ourselves to greater and greater understanding of our Lord Jesus and of his will for us. Let us daily surrender ourselves – as individuals and as a congregation – to Christ, so that he may more effectively use us to proclaim the Good News in our words and actions.

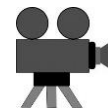

### December 13, 2023

The Dec 9 outbreak of tornadoes caused damage from Rutherford TN through Clarksville TN, impacting hundreds of homes and killing six people.

Mary Bates is on the ground in Clarksville and has been assessing four counties at this time. The first load of emergency relief supplies was delivered Tuesday by Mary and her husband. The second load will be delivered Friday/Saturday.

The **most needed items** are gift cards from Walmart and other stores to purchase new toys for Christmas for children who have lost everything.

The **second most needed item** are rakes, shovels, mops and brooms— or gift cards to purchase these items. The business district of the communities that NALC Disaster Response is working is not as impacted as the residential area.

## *Pasta Fagiole- my idea of Italian Fast Food*

During these cold winter months, nothing tastes better than a hot bowl of soup. This is an easy vegetarian recipe that is tasty & quick to make. You can add browned ground beef, sausage, or chicken, if you want to add more protein.

- Olive oil
- 1 onion, diced
- Several stalks of celery, diced
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 2 cans of great northern or navy beans
- 1 15oz can diced or stewed tomatoes
- 32 oz Chicken or beef broth
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 Tbl Italian seasoning
- Salt & pepper to taste
- 2 tbl Parmesan or Romano cheese
- Datalini or elbow macaroni or any pasta of your choosing

Sauté the onion, celery, & garlic in several Tablespoons of olive oil. When onions are clear, add beans, tomatoes, broth, & seasoning, except the cheese. Simmer for ½ hour or so. Add the cheese and cooked pasta.

Serve with a tossed salad & rustic Italian bread.

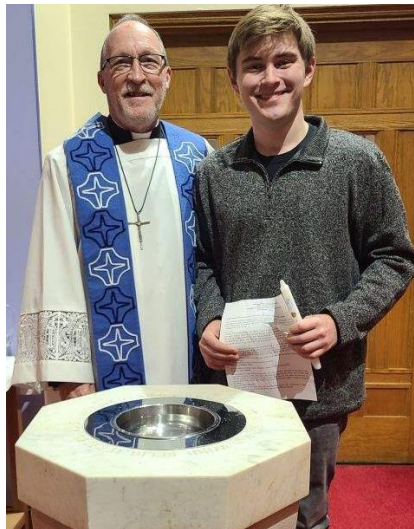

Historical Trivia for January

January 24, 1895 - Hawaii's monarchy ended as Queen Liliuokalani was forced to abdicate. Hawaii was then annexed by the U.S. And remained a territory until statehood was granted in 1959.

Lydia Lili'u Loloku Walania Wewehi Kamaka'eha was born on September 2, 1838, in Honolulu to high-ranking Ali'i Analea Keohokālole and Caesar Kapa'akea. When she was four years old, the princess began attending the boarding school run by missionary Amos Starr Cooke for the Royal Chiefs' children. When she was 10, the school closed as a result of the measles epidemic that took the lives of about 10,000 people, most of whom were Native Hawaiian. Her three-year-old sister Ka'imina'auao, who was the hānai daughter of Kamehameha III and Queen Kalama, also died in the outbreak.

Her brother, King Kalākaua, was appointed to the throne in February 1874, at which time he named his brother William Pitt Leleiohoku as heir to the throne. On April 10, 1877, the day after Leleiohoku died, Princess Lydia Kamaka'eha was named heir apparent and received the title Lili'uokalani. During Kalākaua's final years of reign, wealthy plantation owners and businessmen imposed the "Bayonet Constitution" on the Hawaiian monarchy. The new constitution limited the power of the monarchy and effectively disenfranchised the Hawaiian people. Her beloved brother passed away in 1891, and Lili'uokalani assumed the throne.

One of Queen Lili'uokalani's first orders of business was to amend the constitution and restore power to the monarchy and to the Hawaiian people. The local sugar planters and businessmen instigated an overthrow, fearing a loss of revenue and the influence of the Queen. With the help of U.S. Marines, they forced Queen Lili'uokalani to surrender the Hawaiian Kingdom to the United States in 1893. A provisional government was established and named the Republic of Hawai'i, proclaiming Sanford B. Dole as president.

In 1895, Lili'uokalani was imprisoned for eight months at ʻIolani Palace for her alleged knowledge of a counterrevolutionary attempt by her supporters, although it was never proven. Fearing she would never leave the palace alive, Lili'uokalani translated Kalākaua's text of the cosmogenic Hawaiian creation chant "Kumulipo" into English, with the hope that the rest of the world would know Hawaiian heritage. She was later released on parole and when she received a full pardon, traveled to Washington D.C. to seek help from President Grover Cleveland. Despite all of Lili'uokalani's efforts, in 1898 President William McKinley signed into law a joint resolution of Congress that purported to annex Hawai'i to the United States, although the legality of that act is still in dispute today.

Wild flowers of Pennsylvania

Myosotis scorpioides

Forget-me-not

Also known as Water Forget-me-not, True Forget-me-not, Love-me, Mouse-ear, Mouse-ear Scorpion Grass, Scorpion Weed, and Snake Grass.

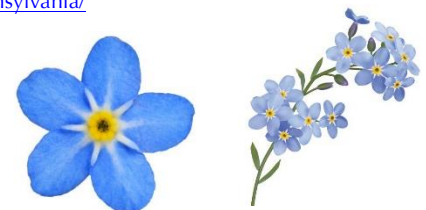
Growing Information

- **USDA Hardiness Zone:** 5-9
- **Life Cycle:** Perennial
- **Approximate mature size:** 6-12" (15-30 cm)
- **Bloom Time:** Spring, Summer, Fall
- **Sun Exposure:** Full Sun, Partial Sun


The Forget-me-not is also known as the Scorpion Weed. The reason for this is because it has a coiled flower stalk like a tail of a scorpion. *Some have also said the common name Forget-me-not comes from this plant's unpleasant taste or odor, which is hard to forget!*

The seeds of Forget-me-nots spread rapidly, and you may find them sprouting up in places you didn't plan for. Don't worry; you can dig up the flower and replant it anywhere you want since they are not bothered by being moved. *I would suggest not destroying the plant because this perennial attracts butterflies, bees, and moths.*

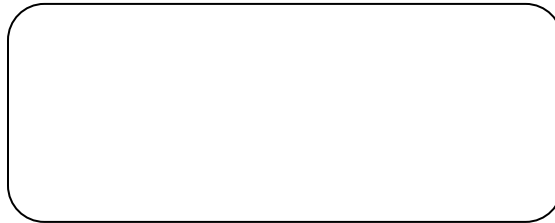
