From the Pastor's Desk: I want to share with you a portion of my sermon on the Third Sunday after the Epiphany (21 January), a sermon about discipleship:

This term – disciple – is at the heart of what it means to be a Christian: a Christian is a disciple; a disciple is a Christian. I emphasize this because it has been frequently suggested that the two terms refer to different people, that is, that there are two different kinds of people: Christians and disciples. For example, it has been said – and I confess to falling into this trap early in my life as a Christian – that there are millions of Christians in today's world, just not enough disciples.

Some have appealed to the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer in his famous book, (*The Cost of*) Discipleship, written in the late 1930s: "Christianity without the living Jesus Christ remains necessarily a Christianity without discipleship; and a Christianity without discipleship is always a Christianity without Jesus Christ." But it seems clear to me that Bonhoeffer was issuing a warning to the German church that had fallen in line with National Socialism, Adolf Hitler, and the Third Reich, a church that was therefore not following Christ but following Satan and evil.

These words of Bonhoeffer were and are truly prophetic. He was uncompromising in his defense of the Christian faith; the circumstances required it. He ultimately gave his life for his faithful proclamation of the gospel.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, our country is falling apart. The moral fabric of our society is torn and tattered. Do you need to be convinced? Open your eyes and ears. Be honest and open. Notice what happens if you or anyone else is asked to give an opinion about some controversial issue, and the approach to the issue is not the popular view but is more "traditional and/or conservative" (two despised terms these days). What do you do? Do you accept the offer to give your opinion (i.e., what you truly believe), risking the possibility of being attacked? Or do you equivocate in order to avoid confrontation?



The common approach today is to label people and opinions who hold traditional views about social, political, theological issues as racists, or some other title ending with "phobe/phobic/phobia", as if these were real, clinical pathologies; they are not. Despite the vileness of real racism and hate, those terms are thrown

around and at people so that those people don't have to be taken seriously; when in fact, they can't be taken seriously, because they've just been labeled as the kind of people who shouldn't be taken seriously!!! (Insidious, isn't it?) As a result, we are deeply fractured and divided. People even turn to protest and violence, trying to frighten others into silence and submission.

If the approach of the early Christians and the Church through the centuries had been equivocation, silence, and retreat, evil would have easily and thoroughly prevailed. Standing for what is right – what we truly understand and believe – has never been easy. It's not going to get easier; quite the contrary! We are witnessing heresy, disbelief, and apostacy "on steroids" (Think back to "the Sparkle Creed" I shared with you on the first Sunday of July last year!).

Lent begins on February 14 (Valentine's Day!!!). Lent is a time given to us for reflection and deep introspection – inspired, led, and empowered by the Holy Spirit – in which we become genuinely honest about ourselves FOR THE SAKE OF THE GOSPEL and, for the ministry of our congregation in living and proclaiming the gospel. Lent is not primarily about becoming a better (e.g., healthier) person; it is about becoming a more faithful disciple, whatever the cost.

Dear NALC Pastors, Partners in Ministry, Greetings in the name of our Triune God as we begin a New Year in our life together in the North American Lutheran Church.

The past year was one in which God blessed our efforts in many ways and enabled and empowered us to take many faith-filled steps in our congregations and as a church body that are already bearing fruit. My prayer is that this coming year would be one in which our ministries will continue to be blessed and through which many would come to a living faith in Jesus Christ.

At our 2020 Mission Convocation, with an overwhelming 89% vote, we adopted a strategic plan known as our 20/20 Vision. The purpose of the Vision, since its inception, was to build on the solid foundation we have, to provide clarity for our future, and to address the challenges and opportunities we face as a growing denomination.

Our primary goal in communicating the Vision as we have is to ensure that our congregations and their members have a strong understanding of the NALC and its commitments, a clear picture of the part they play in our shared work, and why it is so important, if not essential, that we continue working together as a family of faith.

One of the significant steps we have taken since adopting our Vision was in the launching of our "Today, Tomorrow & Forever" financial initiative. The purpose of this initiative is to strengthen the financial foundation of our church body and to enable us to take the strategic steps needed to respond to the opportunities God has given us. Less than a year and a half into this three-year initiative, with a goal of raising five million dollars, we already have commitments of more than \$2.1 million. Many of those pledges have come from individuals, with many others from congregations.

More important than the money that has been pledged has been the impact that has already happened in and through our ministries. Over the past two years we were able to add five area assistants to the bishop, a call process coordinator, and a seminary recruiter. These staffing additions have strengthened the support we offer to our congregations and solidified the raising of future pastors. We have also increased our efforts in congregational renewal, established a centralized church office, expanded the number of mission starts we support, and increased the number of NALC global workers from nine in 2022 to 21 in 2024, thereby strengthening our witness to the Gospel message of Jesus throughout the world.

Moving forward, it is important that we all share in the commitment to raise awareness in our congregations of what's happening and ways to become involved...regular updates on the ongoing impact of the 20/20 Vision on our website at thenalc.org/vision.

My encouragement to you is to engage your congregation in this initiative, let them know what's happening through our shared efforts, and find ways to enable your members to become involved. Along with a congregational commitment, if there are individuals within your congregations who are strong supporters, have a heart for the Gospel, and have been blessed with the capacity to do even more, talk to them about the 20/20 Vision or introduce them to us. We would be more than happy to share what God is doing through our efforts and how their financial support would enable our work to have an even greater impact.

I am truly thankful for the support offered in this past year, as well as for countless ways in which God is growing His kingdom through us. I am also optimistic about what lies ahead of us in the coming year as we continue to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit, trust in the providence of our heavenly Father, and lift up the Name of Jesus that the world might be drawn to Him.

May God continue to bless you in your ministries, and may God continue to bless us as a church body as we work together to ensure a legacy of faith is passed on to future generations, "Today, Tomorrow & Forever." In Christ Jesus, Bishop Dan, North American Lutheran Church

#### *Lentil Soup------*

This soup is a great choice anytime of the year, but especially during *LENT!* It can be made with meat or not, but is a great hearty soup for this early Lenten season!

- 2 olive oil
- Tbl 1 onion chopped
- 1 carrot, diced
- 3 ribs of celery, diced
- 1 potato, chunked
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 c dried lentils
- 15 oz can of diced or crushed tomatoes
- 6 c of broth- ham, beef, chicken or vegetable
- 2 bay leaves
- Parsley, Salt & Pepper to taste



In a stock pot, sauté the onion, celery, carrots, garlic, & potatoes til tender. Add rest of ingredients & simmer for 30-45 minutes.

**Variations**: Add diced ham or browned ground meat to the broth to add more protein. Small pasta, such as dialing, is a nice addition.



#### Historical Trivia for February

<u>February 3, 1943</u> the U.S. Army transport ship *Dorchester* was filled to capacity, carrying 751 passengers, 130 crew members and 23 naval personnel on a journey from Newfoundland to an American military base in Greenland. The 5,649-ton ship was built in 1926 and originally served as a luxury coastal liner. And so by 1943, the ship clearly had seen better days and most of the troops had been quite uneasy boarding such a "lousy old freighter."

The Dorchester was one of three transports in a small convoy, accompanied by three U.S. Coast Guard cutters. Seas were rough and the Dorchester rode the waves poorly, dipping and swaying, bouncing and shuddering as it plowed through the blackness of a cold winter's night.

Throughout the voyage, the four chaplains; George L. Fox, Alexander D. Goode, Clark V. Poling and John P. Washington, helped to soothe the nerves of the 700 young draftees and enlisted men on board by walking among them. They laughed, joked and even put on amateur floor shows every night. The chaplains also held regular religious services which at first were poorly attended. However, attendance increased with every mile the ship sailed further away from home.

To reach Greenland, the convoy had to pass through U-boat infested waters where numerous transports already had been sunk. On the evening of February 2nd, one of the Coast Guard cutters detected a submarine on its sonar and blinked the warning "we are being followed" to Dorchester's Captain, Hans J. Danielsen. An urgent radio call then went out requesting anti-submarine patrol planes. But the response came back that the planes were patrolling "elsewhere." The ships would have to go it alone.

By now, they were only about 150 miles from their final destination and hopes were high they might make it to port without trouble. But as a safety precaution, Captain Danielsen ordered all of the men on board to sleep in their regular clothing and wear life jackets. Many of the men deep in the ship's hold ignored this order due to the sweltering engine heat and the uncomfortable bulkiness of the life jackets.

At one o'clock in the morning of February 3rd, the ship's bell struck twice. It would never sound again. The periscope of German submarine U-223 poked through the water's surface and spotted the ship in its cross hairs. A German officer gave the order to fire torpedoes.

The Dorchester was blasted on its starboard side near the engine room, far below the water line, killing a hundred men and knocking out all power and radio contact. Captain Danielsen was then informed his ship was rapidly taking on water. He gave the order to abandon ship.

Panic now set in among the men below decks as they groped around in the darkness, struggling to get topside. Many had no life jackets or clothing. Those who made it up onto the listing deck immediately realized they were about to die in the Arctic air and frigid water. Lifeboats quickly became overcrowded to the point of capsizing. Rafts were tossed into the sea but drifted away before anyone could get into them. Only two lifeboats out of 14 were successfully launched.

Amid the disorder, the four Army chaplains quietly spread out among the soldiers, preaching courage to the frightened, offering prayers to the wounded, and guiding the disoriented.

After most of the survivors had struggled up on deck, the four chaplains opened a storage locker and began handing out life jackets. Soon they ran out.

"Padre," a young soldier hollered, "I've lost my life jacket and I can't swim!" One of the four chaplains, it is not known which, removed his and said, "Here, take mine. I won't need it. I'm staying." The other three chaplains followed his example. "It was," an eyewitness later recalled, "the finest thing I have ever seen or hope to see this side of heaven."

Now, just 27 minutes after the torpedo struck, the ship was about to go down. The four chaplains locked arms together and braced against the deck with its heavy starboard list. They prayed, each in the tradition of his own faith, as the water reached their knees. A wave swept over the ship, then another, and another. The Dorchester fought to right herself but failed and plunged into the seething ocean.

Of the 902 men aboard, 675 died, leaving just 227 survivors. News of the tragedy and the heroic conduct of the four chaplains caused a sensation in America. On December 19, 1944, the Distinguished Service Cross for "extraordinary heroism" and the Purple Heart were awarded posthumously to the chaplains' next of kin. In 1961, Congress authorized a Special Medal for Heroism which had never been given before and is never to be given again.

#### Wild flowers of Pennsylvania

Fire Pink - Silene virginica

Also known as Scarlet Catchfly, Cliff Pink, Indian Pink.

#### **Growing Information:**

USDA Hardiness Zone: 4-8a

• **Life Cycle:** Perennial

• **Approximate Mature Size:** 8-36 in (20-91 cm) tall

• Bloom Time: Mid Spring to Mid Summer

• **Sun Exposure:** Partial Shade

Fire Pink is a wildflower in Pennsylvania that is carnivorous.

Carnivorous plants that trap and eat insects sound like something from a tropical jungle, but we have tons of them in North America! The sticky hairs on its leaves trap prey and discourage ants and other pests from eating the leaves.

Fire Pink has five bright red petals that flare out into long tubes. Although this plant is pollinated primarily by hummingbirds, many small songbirds eat its seeds. *Juncos, Pine Siskins, and sparrows are all common birds attracted to it.*

Leap Year Trivia - Popping the Question: According to tradition, it's OK for a woman to propose to a man on Feb. 29. The custom has been attributed to various historical figures including St. Bridget, who is said to have complained to St. Patrick that women had to wait too long for their suitor to pop the question. The obliging Patrick supposedly gave women one day to propose, says the BBC.
