From the Pastor's Desk:

What, then, shall we say? That we are to remain in sin, in order that grace may increase? Absolutely not! How can we who died to sin still live in it? Or are you ignorant of the fact that as many as were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were crucified with him, therefore, through baptism into death, in order that as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, in this way we also might walk in newness of life. For if we have become united with him in the likeness of his death, we will certainly also be in the likeness of his resurrection" (Romans 6.1-5; my translation).

These powerful words of St. Paul affirm the reality that baptism is about new life – resurrection life. No life is lived out in one moment; it goes on and on. We *live* as Christians, followers of the crucified, risen, ascended and reigning Lord, Jesus Christ. Becoming a Christian – being brought "into Christ" – is not a single transaction with no lasting effects; it is the beginning of that new life, being born anew ("walking in newness of life").

We just celebrated the Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord – Easter. We affirmed together, "He is risen! He is risen, indeed!" Until the Feast of Pentecost, we will be in the Easter Season; the Sundays are the Sundays of Easter. But the effects of Easter do not end on Pentecost Sunday; in fact, on Pentecost we celebrate the outpouring of the life of the crucified, risen, and ascended Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit, "the promise of the Father."

The resurrection is essential for everything that we are and believe as Christians. Paul makes that abundantly clear in 1 Corinthians 15: "If Christ has not been raised, our preaching is futile and your faith is empty; you are still in your sins. If Christ has not been raised, then those who have fallen asleep (i.e., died) in Christ have also perished." Without the resurrection there is no hope. Without the resurrection we worship an exceptional man who died and was buried, period.

The resurrection of Jesus set a new order into motion – the age to come has already begun, here and now. The very thing that the Jews of Jesus' day expected to happen at the end of history – the resurrection – happened to the man Jesus in the middle of history. That's why the Jewish leaders arrested Peter and John: "they were teaching the people and announcing *in Jesus* the resurrection of the dead" (Acts 4.2). The issue was

not that they were proclaiming the resurrection – most Jews believed that it would happen, but only at the end of all things; the issue was that Peter and John were proclaiming the resurrection *in Jesus*, that it had already happened to someone *before the end*!

Our life, today, is life in Christ, life empowered by the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of resurrection. How we live matters, because it is no longer our lives; it is Christ's life. Being his disciples – his followers – means yielding ourselves – totally and unreservedly – to him so that he lives in us and through us for the sake of the world, for the sake of those who do not know him, for the sake of those whose lives are broken. By living the resurrection life we announce the Good News of Jesus, the Son of God, who gave himself for us and for the whole world, to make us whole and to restore us to God the Father. Living the Resurrection means living in hope and certainty, whatever we may face.

That is not a "seasonal" occupation; it's about the life we live every day: on Easter, at Pentecost, during Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, and Lent. May God the Father continue to empower us with his Holy Spirit and form more and more of our lives into the likeness of Christ.

He is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! ~Pastor Phillips

NALC Disaster Response continues to:

- conduct disaster preparedness trainings: 9 disaster preparedness trainings and 1 "train the trainer" event, as we are training mission district disaster coordinators to do training!
- 12 NALC Disaster Response Sundays have been held at this time. Gift cards are really needed!
- coordinate servant event mission trips 22 volunteer teams of youth and adults have completed servant event mission trips to date thank you Jesus!
- hold "Stuff the Truck" events 29 Stuff the Truck events have been held in addition to numerous
 deliveries to our warehouses. After the Arkansas tornado outbreak, we emptied 5 of our regional
 disaster warehouses and your help is needed to restock! Schedule a "Stuff the Truck" now...

<u>Texas Wildfires</u> – NALC Disaster Response is responding to the million acre or 1,700 square miles of wildfires blanketing the panhandle of Texas and moving into Oklahoma. Texas Gov. Greg Abbott issued a disaster declaration this week [February 27] for 60 counties as the Smokehouse Creek Fire became the second largest in Texas history. Thousands of people were ordered to evacuate as the wildfire remains 3% contained and other wildfires burned, leaving at least one person dead in addition to thousands of head of livestock. [On March 14th the fire is 89% contained]

The Smokehouse Creek fire broke out Monday, February 26 and NALC Disaster Response is delivering the first load emergency relief supplies to the town of Borger and Fritch today, [Thursday, February 29]. The second load is scheduled for Saturday to the town of Canadian, TX. Future loads are in the process of being scheduled.

Monetary donations and gift cards are the priority needs and may be sent to NALC Disaster Response as soon as possible. Mary Bates has been in touch with each community and has identified the emergency needs, which are quilts (no power to heat homes left standing), school supplies, health kits & baby care items such as diapers for those in shelters, flood buckets/cleaning supplies (to start washing down homes), kitchen kits for those sheltering in hotels, and Bibles. Future needs will include water hoses, rakes, shovels and gift cards to purchase ranch supplies such as feed cubes, feed, and fencing supplies.

Please help if you possibly can – the high temperatures, the dead winter grass and the high winds combined to create this disaster of wildfires that are impacting so many people.

As we end this Lenten season and celebrate Christ's glorious resurrection, let this be a time to rejoice in all that the Living God does for us. The new green growth of Spring signals a time of growth & renewal! May we all look forward with hope to the warm days ahead and to all of the blessings that God has in store for us!

Notes from the Kitchen....

- Things are going well in the kitchen. We still are serving well over 200 meals each week. The first week of March, the Average number of meals served by the Community Meal Ministries was 214. The first week of the month is typically the fewest number of meals served during the month, so it will be interesting to see our numbers by the end of the month.
- We continue to be blessed with weekly donations from Butler Farm Market, Panera, & St Vincent DePaul. These donations help us to stretch our food dollars while providing hot nutritious meals to our neighbors who need them the most. Make sure to patronize these businesses & thank them for their support!
- Our flexible pot filler faucet has been installed & has made filling large pots of water for cooking noodles, pasta, or rice so much easier on our cooks. An additional GFI outlet has been added to the wall by the smaller prep sink to prevent blowing the circuit breaker.
- While we are talking about appliances- KK will be purchasing an additional upright freezer/refrigerator in the next couple of months. The church freezer at St Mark's died in mid-March & they needed to replace it quickly. They had to purchase a smaller freezer/refrigerator but are hoping to get a larger one in the next couple of months. Anyone helping at KK knows how short we are of refrigerator space, especially during growing season! As Raylene says," God always provides". ●
- Jean Stockburger & I recently completed the Serve Safe certification through Penn State Extension that is required for food service professionals. Food safety is a critical part of this course. It will help insure that the meals we serve weekly are safe for our neighbors to eat.
- Plans for the Gala are being finalized. We are looking forward to an exciting evening of great art, wine by Anna Marie, light refreshments, music, & fellowship! Our Butler Lions will be tending the bar & making announcements as needed. There will be an ATM in the hall for your convenience. Please make plans to join us! Tickets can be purchased for \$30 at the church office during regular hours or at the door. Sunday afternoon is free to the public. We will be drawing for the basket raffle, quilt raffle, & 50/50 about 2 pm. Winners need NOT be present!

Hoppin' John

Black-eyed peas simmered with a smoky ham hock until creamy and tender and full of flavor!

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon oil
- 1 cup onion, diced
- 1/2 cup celery, diced
- 1/2 cup green pepper, diced
- 1 tablespoon garlic, chopped
- 2 cups black-eyed peas, soaked overnight and rinsed
- 4 cups ham broth or chicken broth or chicken stock
- 1 small ham hock (or 2 cups cubed ham)
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- cayenne to taste
- salt & pepper to taste
- 4 green onions, sliced

Directions

Heat the oil in a pan over medium heat.

Add the onions, celery and pepper and cook until tender, about 10-15 minutes.

Add the garlic and cook until fragrant, about a minute.

Add the peas, broth, ham hock, bay leaf, thyme, cayenne, salt and pepper, bring to a boil, reduce the temperature and simmer until the black-eyed peas are creamy and tender, about 60 minutes, adding more broth if required.

Remove the ham hock and shred the pork and mix it into the black eyed peas.

Serve over steamed rice and garnish with green onions.

Option: For One-Pan: Make this a one-pan meal by adding 1 cup of rice and 2 cups broth or water (or 8 ounces of pasta and 2 1/4 cups broth or water) to the sauce after step 4 and simmer, covered, until cooked, about 20 minutes (or 12 minutes for pasta)



Historical Trivia for April

<u>This Day in History: FDR vs. Montgomery Ward - April 26, 1944 - Federal troops seized the Chicago offices of Montgomery Ward and removed its chairman after his refusal to obey President Roosevelt's order to recognize a CIO union. The seizure ended when unions won an election to represent the company's workers.</u>

The use of federal power was brazen, to say the least. But FDR had spent his entire presidency expanding the scope of federal power. Perhaps his audacity wasn't so surprising after all.

During the war years, FDR reinstituted a WWI-era War Labor Board. He didn't want worker strikes to affect the war effort. His Labor Board was supposed to prevent such a situation by helping to arbitrate labor disputes.

At Montgomery Ward, none of this went over so well. Indeed, there was a dispute about whether the company's products even affected the war—at all. Should they really be subject to the decisions of this Labor Board?

The retailer had its own set of problems to deal with, even without FDR's demands.

Montgomery Ward had survived the Great Depression, but the company had struggled to keep up with competitors such as Sears. In order to save his company, CEO Sewell Avery took many cost-cutting actions: He saved the company financially, but his actions also led to a series of disputes with the company's workers. By April 1944, the company's labor agreements were expiring, which meant the workers could again go on strike. FDR jumped in, ordering Avery to sign a new contract or to have his company seized. Avery refused.

He was literally carried out of his company, feet first, by soldiers. Just before he was carried out, he snapped at the U.S. Attorney General: "I want none of your damned advice. . . . To hell with the government!"

The Attorney General was "deeply shocked," as historian Thomas Fleming explains. "He later claimed he saw Avery's defiance endangering the entire war effort. Exactly how, the attorney general never adequately explained."

The company was returned to Avery's control in early May, but Avery still refused to accept the Union contract. Matters simmered again for a while, then came to a head in December when Montgomery Ward's workers went on strike. On December 27, FDR again ordered seizure of the retailer. He told the country: "The Government of the United States cannot and will not tolerate any interference with war production in this critical hour."

The second time around, Avery was not carried out of the building. He stayed in his office while Major General Joseph Byron used an office nearby. It would be nearly a year before the government would relinquish control of the company back to Avery.

The retail giant was never the same again, partly because Avery became so suspicious of the government that he sat on hordes of cash. Other retailers, such as Sears, were investing in their companies and growing. Avery was not. The free market, finally back at work again, did not reward Avery's decision. Eventually, as we all know, Montgomery Ward could not stay afloat, and it went out of business.

Wild flowers of Pennsylvania

Creeping Charlie - Glechoma headracea

Also known as Gill-over-ground, Ground Ivy, Hedgemaids, Field Balm, Tunhoof, Catsfoot, Run-away-robin, and Alehoof.

Growing Information

• **USDA Hardiness Zone:** 3a-10b

• **Life Cycle:** Perennials

• Approximate mature size: 5-8" (12.5-20 cm)

• Bloom Time: Spring, Summer

• **Sun Exposure:** Sun to Partial Shade

This wildflower grows in large groups in moist semi-shaded areas and tolerates the sun very well. Bees especially love collecting pollen from Creeping Charlie.

Many people in Pennsylvania consider this wildflower a weed.

If you were to search for Creeping Charlie on the Internet you'll quickly discover that there are more websites that offer suggestions to eradicate this plant instead of eating it. This aromatic, perennial, evergreen creeper is in the mint (Lamiaceae) family. Creeping Charlie is an herbaceous plant that spreads by seed and by stolons (creeping stems). Native to Europe, it was brought to North American by the European settlers as medicine and as a ground cover. This minty edible contains a lot of vitamin C and offers a multitude of health benefits. This plant overwinters maintaining its colour under the snow.

Flowers - Flowers can appear as early as March in the northern hemisphere depending on location. They are purplish to blue and are quite small, about 1 cm long. Creeping Charlie flowers usually grow in clusters of three in the axils (between the stem and petiole) and are two-lipped. They have five petals, and the petals are fused into a cup or tube. Flowers grow in axillary whorls, often one-sided. Each flower produces four seeds.

Leaves - Creeping Charlie leaves produce bright, shiny green, round or kidney-shaped leaves that are broadly cordate and have scalloped margins. Sometimes the leaves may appear to be tinted purple, especially the under side. The leaf surface has sparse, short hairs. Leaves are opposite on square stems that root at the nodes. Leaf veins rise from the same point and they have palmate veins.

Edible Parts - Young leaves can be eaten raw or cooked. The leaves have a mild mint-like flavour and can be tossed into salads to add a slight aromatic tang. Creeping Charlie leaves can also be cooked like spinach, added to soups, stews, or omelettes. Tea is made from the fresh or dried leaves. It is often used mixed with verbena leaves or lovage. This wild edible has been added to beer in much the same way as hops in order to clear it and also to improve its flavour.
